The City Manager's Monthly Report is intended to provide a summary of City activities. Due to the variety and complexity of City functions, however, the report is not all-encompassing. Please always feel free to contact me for more information or with questions or concerns.

The following are highlighted activities from my office from June 17 – July 14, 2023:

- Staff conducted weed/grass and non-conforming structure hearings.
- Staff attended a systemwide divisional leader meeting to receive an operations update.
- Provided weekly staffing report to the United States Marshals Service for the Cimarron Correctional Facility.
- Met with Commissioner B.J. Roberson to provide an operational update.
- Attended the monthly Cushing Economic Development Foundation meeting.
- Staff and I met with Cushing Economic Development Foundation Director Bruce Johnson and others to advance the possibility of a business incubator in Cushing. Significant progress was made in this meeting.
- Assistant City Manger Derek Griffith met with division leaders to recap the recent windstorm and our ongoing operational efforts.
- Assistant City Manager Derek Griffith presented to Leadership Cushing, offering a recap of FY 22 – 23.
- Attended two Board of Adjustment meetings at City Hall.
- Worked with local business owner to resolve a power issue.
- Continuing working with Stephen Gose, P.E, Gose and Associates of Stillwater, regarding the proposed new bathrooms in Memorial Park. Provided CAD files so additional updates could be made to the proposed facility.
- Staff reestablished the storm collection site on Texaco Road until the end of July, opening on weekends only from 8:00 a.m. 4:00 p.m.
- Staff and I met with Cooper-Bessemer virtually to discuss repairs to Unit #10, which started last Tuesday.
- Staff and I observed public safety active threat training at the Cushing Upper Elementary.
- Staff hosted a bid opening for the fencing project at the airport. There were no bidders.

• Staff and I went to Professional Engineering Consultants (PEC) of Tulsa to review the pre-kickoff plans for the Lead Service Line Inventory project.

Walking Trail II

This project is made possible by a grant from the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and the Cushing Hospital Authority. Here is an update on the project to date:

- The south parking lot near 5th and Thompson is ready for concrete. A new LED light will be installed too. (Photo Right)
- New black vinyl fencing has been installed around the duck pond.
- New benches have arrived and are awaiting installation.
- The electrician is close to finishing and the lighting will be ready to activate.
- All work is anticipated to be completed by August 15th if the weather is cooperative.

Staff has been working with administration to identify a qualified candidate for one vacancy through interview and testing.

Notable Activities:

Partnered with Mullins Salvage for the use of six salvaged cars for upcoming vehicle extrication training.

Worked with Randy WIlliams from American Genesis to host a 16-hour vehicle extrication class for all shift personnel that will include in-service training on our new extrication tools.

Assisted shift personnel with fireworks show.

Hosted a three-day LSU/NCBRT ATIRC (Active Threat Integrated Course) for police and fire personnel at the upper elementary school to be better prepared for an active threat event.

Setup Fire Marshalls office for video conference/meetings.

Conducted interviews and physical fitness test to fill the vacancy left by Chief Griffith's retirement. We have a good candidate selected and he has accepted a contingent job offer.

Plains Pipeline produced a pipeline safety video that will be used across the nation for pipeline safety. This video will feature fire and police administration along with shift personnel from both police and fire departments.

Shift personnel continue annual fire hydrant testing and maintenance. This includes lubrication, water flow testing, smooth operation, and fresh paint.

The department has been notified by CMS that it has been selected in round three for cost reporting requirements related to EMS. The reporting period is for one year. This will be a labor-intensive reporting requirement and we are preparing for our submissions which are set to begin with the start of the fiscal year, July 1st, 2023.



The crime data above is derived from reports completed by CPD officers and submitted to the OSBI database. CPD provides crime and arrest data monthly to the OSBI along with 415 sheriffs' offices and police departments in Oklahoma. These reports form the database from which the Uniform Crime Report (UCR) is created. Eight offenses comprise the Crime Index and serve as indicators of Cushing's crime trends. These offenses are known as Part I offenses and include murder, rape, robbery, felonious assault, breaking and entering, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson.



Our young team of Lineman and Apprentices, along with crews from GRDA, Edmond, Stillwater, and Arkansas Electric Tree Trimming Crews, worked very hard to get the lines and power back on to the city. We also could not have pulled this off without every department helping to move the trees and answering the calls. I WANT TO SAY THANK YOU FOR ALL YOUR HARD WORK AND SPECIAL THANKS TO DUB HARGROVE.
