RE:DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITY REPORT

The City Manager's Monthly Report is intended to provide a summary of City activities. Due to the variety and complexity of City functions, however, the report is not all-encompassing. Please always feel free to contact me for more information or with questions or concerns.

The following are highlighted activities from my office from April 15 – May 12, 2023:

- Staff conducted weed/grass and non-conforming structure hearings.
- Staff attended a systemwide divisional leader meeting to receive an operations update.
- Provided weekly staffing report to the United States Marshals Service for the Cimarron Correctional Facility.
- Commissioner BJ Roberson attended and presented at the monthly legislative luncheon hosted by the Cushing Chamber of Commerce at the Steer Inn.
- Attended the Cushing Economic Development Foundation monthly meeting.
- Staff and I met with the I.A.F.F. to continue negotiations for FY 23 24. We have secured a tentative agreement.
- Met with Commissioner B.J. Roberson to provide an operational update.
- Met with the Cushing Economic Development sub-committee at RCB to receive an update from Cushing Economic Development Foundation Director Bruce Johnson regarding ongoing projects.
- Led the Cushing Lion's Club Jr. Olympics. I was joined by staff from public safety at this event.
- Staff and I met with Commissioner Tyson Branyan to provide a financial overview.
- Attended the monthly Cushing Chamber of Commerce meeting.
- Met with Fraternal Order of Police President Garvis Thomas to discuss issues related to the police contract. The meeting was very positive.
- Staff and I met to discuss safety improvements throughout the park system.
- Hosted a meeting with an out of state developer to discuss opportunities in Cushing.
- Met with Cushing Disc Golf President Dustin Mucklerath to resolve an open issue, which was successfully resolved.
- Hosted a virtual meeting with Professional Engineering of Tulsa to prepare for the copper and lead inventory.

- Met with the leadership at Hillcrest Hospital Cushing to receive an operational update.
- Staff and I hosted a budget workshop for the Commission and community.
- Staff and I went to the home of the resident who has concerns about our pot-bellied pig ordinance to discuss their concerns and possible options.
- Accompanied CLS on a walking inspection of the newest trail head in Memorial Park. The trail work is progressing well.
- Completed engineering consultant paperwork related to the S.H. 18 rehabilitation project (North Street to Deep Rock Road), filing it with the Oklahoma Department of Transportation project engineer for review and subsequent approval by ODOT. Our engineer will be working with the state regarding water and sanitary sewer conflicts. Electric distribution will also be included but will not be as project impactful as water and sanitary sewer lines that will conflict with the proposed improvements.

<u>S.H. 18 Improvements – North Street to Deep Rock Road</u>:

As part of proposed Trustee action, staff is proposing a series of engineering agreements with Professional Engineering Consultants of Tulsa, Oklahoma to formally begin the process of working with ODOT to improve Little Avenue (S.H. 18) from North Street to Deep Rock Road. Our part will include engineering for conflicting water and sanitary sewer lines. The plans process is currently at 62%.

In 2020, sanitary sewer and waterlines were relocated at Deep Rock Road and Little Avenue (S.H. 18) as part of the proposed improvement that will start and go north. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation has announced additional projects that will have a positive impact on Cushing. The future projects are as follows:



 <u>2023 - JP: 29837(04)</u>: Widen & Resurface - SH-18: from SH-51, extend north 3.75 miles to the Pawnee County line (North of Cushing)



- <u>2024 JP: 34361 (04)</u>: Ultrathin SH-33: from Harmony Road to Creek County line This project will include repaying both side of S.H. 33
- <u>2025 JP: 28968(04)</u>: Widen & Resurface SH-18: from 2.0 miles north of S.H. 33, extending north 6.5 miles to SH-51
- <u>2025 JP: 33365(04)</u>: Grade, Drain, Bridge & Surface SH-18: from SH-33, extend north 2.0 miles to E690

Walking Trail II

This project is made possible by a grant from the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and the Cushing Hospital Authority. Here is an update on the project to date:

- Concrete trails are installed around the entire park area. The walkways have been inspected and verified for compliance and quality.
- The exception is the west end tie in that will be modified to incorporate changes to allow traffic with pedestrian protection.
- The parking area near the log cabin pavilion has been installed.
- The new drainage has been installed along the parking area off High Street.
- The electrical portion of the project has begun with assistance from the City.
- The bridge abutments were scheduled to be poured this week, but weather may impact the schedule.
- The bridge is scheduled for delivery around the 25th of May and will be installed accordingly.
- The benches are still scheduled for delivery June 28th.
- The fence construction will begin on May 26th.
- The overall construction schedule is running approximately 3.5 weeks ahead of the projected schedule; however, weather may now impact it some.

Sales/Use/Tobacco/Hotel & Motel Tax

Sales tax comes from retail sales in Cushing. Use tax is charged at the same rate and comes from goods purchased elsewhere and shipped or brought to Cushing, like online sales or equipment not available from Oklahoma suppliers.



Cushing Police Department Crime Data Table

The crime data above is derived from reports completed by CPD officers and submitted to the OSBI database. CPD provides crime and arrest data monthly to the OSBI along with 415 sheriffs' offices and police departments in Oklahoma. These reports form the database from which the Uniform Crime Report (UCR) is created. Eight offenses comprise the Crime Index and serve as indicators of Cushing's crime trends. These offenses are known as Part I offenses and include murder, rape, robbery, felonious assault, breaking and entering, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson.


